IRS Audit: The US Internal Revenue Service, IRS, recently audited our Club for the 2020 tax year to determine in part whether it would be appropriate for the Club to continue as a 501 c 7. (A 501 c 3 is a charitable organization to which donations are tax deductible while a 501 c 7 is a charitable organization run for the benefit of its members to which donations are not deductible.) IRS audits can be scary and require lots of work, but this audit has been completed and its outcome is very good.

The Club gave voting rights to its social members and paid \$330 in taxes, there were no penalties, and we keep our 501 c7 status. Going forward, we can allow non-members to participate in Club events such as Dine & Discover or tournaments but when we do so we must both keep detailed records of each non-member involved and potentially pay federal tax on income from the non-members.

Court Scheduling: Scheduling courts is always a big issue at the NCC. Although the CFA owns the courts, it relies on the Club's rules for Club members' scheduling those courts. The Croquet Committee and the Task Force on Scheduling worked for most of a year and jointly produced a recommendation that the Board adopted. As of April 30, 2024, with only a few exceptions, each member must reserve his/her own court for that member's twosome or foursome. Members continue to be able to book up to two weeks in advance.

Where are Those New Courts?

As you have likely heard, the plan is to raise much of the Dry Retention Area (aka Palm Courts) to ground level so we can fit in five new championship courts there and one by the pond.

Progress has been maddeningly slow in getting answers. First, we have to get Palm Beach County and FEMA to approve our plans to fill much of that area because **it is now designated a Flood Control Zone for storage of about 90,000 cubic feet of water.**

Complicating matters is the fact that our entire site is zoned residential. That means we are required to file for a variance to convert the back part of the property for use as proper croquet courts. It turns out that will require one or more public hearings after the basic plans are approved. An expansion of our existing parking and other changes are also required and planned.

A parallel initiative is underway to get the newly acquired, 2.23–acre adjoining property at 885 West Patrick Circle re-zoned for croquet courts and merged into our existing property. Plans are already drawn for four new, championship courts there, pending those approvals.



In addition to the architect and engineer involved on this project, we have retained a Land-Use firm as expediters and a law firm specializing in zoning to help us through this process. They did the research and estimate we will need at least a further nine months to resolve all these issues and get the needed approvals.

We are doing everything we possibly can to speed along this cumbersome process, including a possible filing with Palm Beach County to rezone the entire property instead of asking for variances, but neither process will be speedy.

Bottom line -- Please be patient. We want those new courts as badly as you do, and we're doing our best to make that happen as soon as possible.

Who In the World is Hope Harmon?

Have you ever wondered, when glancing at the deadness board on court two, who is **Hope Harmon**? Hope Harmon died recently at the age of 91, but her legacy will always be part of the National Croquet Club.



Born in Esperanza in Mexico, Hope lived and worked in Arlington, Virginia and Texas for a great part of her life. How she came to play croquet is unclear, but play she did. She loved the sport and the players loved her. Hope broke the grass ceiling playing in many tournaments as a woman playing against some of the strongest male players in the croquet world. In 1996 and 1997, she won the U.S. Open International Rules "A" flight competition.

"Her playing was stellar, but what set her apart was her vivacious personality," says **David McCoy. Johnnie Mitchell** adds, "She had a big heart and if anyone needed a place to stay for a tournament or anything else, she welcomed them into her home,"

Hope had an advanced degree in medical engineering among other degrees, and created the only regulation grass croquet courts in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico. If you are in the area, it's worth a visit if just for the view.

Hope Harmon was a generous benefactor and munificent donor to the National Croquet Club in the early days of the club's existence. She will by missed and remembered by everyone who had the pleasure and the privilege to know her.

Alice, is life a distorted reality or only a dream?


