Summer Promises No Rest for the NCC Expansion Team

Courts, Lights, Parking: Here's the Latest

Courts. We passed the two Public Hearings with the Zoning Commissioners and the County Commissioners without comment or objection. Now the County is reviewing the Administrative Change proposed by our engineering consultants to raise the back five courts to one foot below the level of our existing courts, including the addition of a Pavilion beyond court 6 & 7 with bathrooms and an entertainment space. That application and plan must undergo staff review and approval by all of the affected departments. We are pressing to get early consideration.



Parking. To replace the current volume of water retention displaced by raising the courts, we must install 700' of 8' X 6' exfiltration trenches in the parking lot, so there will be significant construction there this summer. We are also expanding parking by 25 spaces in the north parking area toward the hedge.

Practice Court. Preliminary work on the \% size practice court by the pond has begun with property fence line cleared and trees trimmed. On completion, a new fence, screening hedge, and attractive plantings will be added. We are awaiting bids from two additional contractors, but we are finally underway! The first contractor's bid for the entire project came in considerably higher than expected, so we are seeking two additional bids.

Lights. Our second bid finally arrived, and it appears we may be able to light the interior eight courts within our \$300,000 cost target. There may be a backlog in getting the 30' aluminum poles needed. We are still investigating alternatives. Whatever the lead time, we need to have the money in hand, so please donate!

Many decisions are yet to be made, but we have a great team! Vernon Pierce, just elected to the CFA Board, is now leading the team and providing architectural plans and project management. Many thanks as well to Randy Cardo (construction), David Kepner (building), Bob Broadway (county approvals), Derek Wassink (engineering) and Bob Smith (landscape). In addition, we have a lawyer, a land use expert, and an engineering firm as consultants for our filings with the County, not to mention the surveyor, the traffic study firm, the irrigation company, the well drilling company, etc. – all this to move some dirt and grow some grass! Who knew???

The National Croquet Center Hosts the USCA Golf Croquet National Doubles/Singles Tournament














2024-5 Season Volunteer Recognition Brunch (cont'd)



Finding the Perfect, Most Challenging Hoop

The Race is On - Court 9 Is Testing the Best

As one of the top croquet competition venues in the world, the National Croquet Center must have the most challenging hoops (wickets) for top notch tournament play. Better players need tight hoops. Our normal "Superhoops" are so easy for them that the first player to get control is likely to win. Even though the hoops are set almost to contact, the ball will still go through if it's a touch off center. Not so with the Quadway hoop. Something about its unique design rejects the ball if it doesn't hit dead center.

The top croquet clubs are all switching to this new hoop. We have 12 sets ready to use at the Center for the WCF World Championship in mid-October. The Quadway has a slimmer upright and a fatter, slightly rectangular base and that works beautifully in clay or well compacted soil. The uprights can be rotated in play to provide four different widths, and it has other unique features.

So, what's the problem? Our soil is too sandy and loose to hold the wicket firmly for a sufficient period. Thus, they must be reset more often than Superhoops. The large hole made by its base, when repaired, leaves the soil less compacted. When the grass grows back, and we eventually come back to that position, the hoops no longer hold as well. This is a serious maintenance issue.

Michael Todorovich, **Kim Jones** who is an engineer, **Jay Carey** and I are on a mission to fix the problem. We are experimenting with all possibilities: adding fins on the Quadway base in various configurations to remain firm longer; find or invent a better hoop with new designs altogether that minimally disrupt the soil. At least two other croquet equipment manufacturers are also experimenting.

Meanwhile, don't be upset if you see a variety of hoops being tested – probably on Court 9. And don't worry if you hate hard-to-score hoops. For everyday play we intend to have certain courts using the new hoop and others continuing to have the current Superhoops, with the ratio and location set by your Croquet Committee. I remember when we switched from iron to Superhoops, there were many complaints about difficulty. Now, we all got better and they're just fine. Court one, for the public lessons may have especially easy hoops to increase success and enjoyment.


