Members Speak Their Minds Loud and Clear






On behalf of the Social, Croquet, Volunteer and Membership Committee Chairs, I would like to express a heartfelt thank you to everyone who responded to this year's Member Survey! Your participation hit about a third of our membership—an impressive feat surpassing the average 10-15% from traditional market research polls.

Here are some key takeaways: Mornings remain the favored time for games, with organized events like Strikers and Wine & Wickets drawing peak attendance. New members lean towards afternoon and evening plays, while those with 3-5 years tenure prefer midday sessions, and the seasoned veterans of 5+ years opt for early mornings. **GC is in high demand**, with requests for more beginner clinics for GC and advanced sessions for A6W.

Our stalwart members with 5+ years of tenure shine as volunteers, while newer members express interest but feel hesitant due to lack of experience with the games or technical skills. The 3-5 year tenure group appears to be less involved in volunteering activities. Various reasons were cited for not volunteering, including scheduling conflicts, travel constraints, health issues, and other commitments.





When it comes to organized social events, both new and long-standing members actively participate, while the 3-5 year members exhibit the lowest participation. Scheduling remains a primary barrier to event attendance, with a strong desire expressed for **more social gatherings** (not necessarily revolving around croquet) at different times of the day or the week.

According to over half of the respondents, we love the welcoming atmosphere of the NCC and social camaraderie of the game. Close behind is our picturesque venue, where the beauty of the grounds and the conviviality of the clubhouse create the perfect setting to relax with a drink, food and friends.

Unsurprisingly, the majority of respondents look forward to **facility upgrades**, including more lawns and improved equipment. Additionally, concerns were raised about the negative attitudes of certain members, reflecting the importance of fostering a positive and inclusive environment for all.

On the question of **dress code**, members overwhelmingly love the whites! Nearly a third of the responses suggest a looser policy on the dress code with light colors or lesser restrictions during evenings and weekends.

Your input has been invaluable, providing crucial insights for our committees and guiding us in tailoring our plans to enhance your playing experience in the upcoming seasons.

In the newsletter of February 2024, Tom talked about volunteering. He feels that every member should volunteer for something. By volunteering, you become more invested in the club as well as getting to know the other members on a more personal level. An area where you can volunteer is on a committee or a task force. This column will focus on committees.

Committees are important, for a variety of reasons. They offer the opportunity for:

- Member opinion in decision-making, and serve needs of the membership through interaction and compromises.
- Group problem-solving.
- A forum for presenting multiple points of view.
- A training ground for future club leadership.

Some committees offer the members the ability to use their special skills to improve the club, such as in audit and finance.

How many of you know how many committees we have? There are eight. They consist of membership, croquet, volunteer, grievance, social, nominating, finance and audit. They serve an ongoing function and they continue indefinitely.

Let us briefly explore the function of the committees. The membership committee is charged with recruiting new members and retaining existing members. The croquet committee oversees the croquet tournaments, programs and events. The volunteer committee is charged with finding volunteers to teach new members how to play the various games of croquet. In addition, they find volunteer coaches for the CFA's outside events catered by SandyJames.

The grievance committee is charged with advising the Board on matters concerning member conduct. The social committee, finance and audit committees are selfexplanatory.

In summary, I have tried to spur your passion for volunteering and hope you will become involved in a committee when a vacancy occurs. Volunteering will give you a better sense of belonging to the club as you make friendships.

Volunteering at Events Is Win-Win for the Club and Croquet. Try it. You'll Like it!

At its April 9 meeting, the Club Board discussed the report from our great Volunteer Committee Co-Chairs Lynn Foley and Susan Langston. It was an outstanding year for events! Since Sept. 12, the CFA has had 50 events requiring a total of 328 volunteer opportunities (coaches). Seventy-nine members volunteered to help coach those events, exposing new people to the game that we all love, and ten members even volunteered more than 10 times each! Some members, however, failed to help even once.

Susan and Lynn reported that sometimes it is a struggle to get enough coaches for the bigger events (150+), especially on weekend evenings. While volunteers love the experience, overreliance on a few can cause "burn out." A Task Force appointed by President **Tom Lindley** is finding creative ways to encourage others to sign up, and several of those new ideas will soon be implemented.

Volunteers receive recognition for their service in numerous ways. Before the event they have an excellent full meal that includes beverage (including wine), salad, entrée, and dessert. They also collect coupons for dollars off certain costs at the NCC. Whenever possible "newbie" coaches are partnered with experienced coaches. During the meal, instructions are given on where to go and what to do.

The coaching involves 60 or 90 minutes demonstrating a few basics of golf croquet, then helping players learn and have fun. Many large events are composed of a company's best and most productive employees from around the country or the world, and our volunteers have fun meeting them! Be a "good citizen" of our Club and give volunteering a try. As the saying goes "Try it! You'll like it."
