Want to Improve Your Game?

How About A Fun Croquet "Challenge?"

Do you love the competition of the game of GC or A 6W, but can't give three days to compete in the regular NC Club Tournament?

The croquet committee (Bob Van Tassell, Dave Spivey, Lynn Foley, Linda Merk, Julia Johnston, Mike Todorovich, Caryl Firth, Tom Cooper) came up with this idea to give members more options. The intention is to entice more members into competitive play. Competition helps improve your game!

Members shared with us how much they like having an **Opening Reception** before competing and a **Toast & Tally Reception after**. So, we came up with a new option. We call it "The Challenge."

The idea is simple: Those who wish to play in either Golf Croquet or A6Wicket doubles sign up. Find a partner or we will assign one. We will hold an Opening Reception for the combined GC & A6W players. We also felt this would be a good opportunity for the GC and A6W players to socialize together. A few people might enter both, which you can do because scheduling will be done at your convenience.

We are looking to kick-off "The Challenge" in March. Sign up sheets will be located on the sign in desk. The number of players who sign up will determine the number of blocks. The block play works is if there are five teams in a block. Your team would play the other four teams at a mutually convenient time. Then call the "Challenge Facilitator" to report your score. The winner is based on wins, net hoops, who beat who and gross points. Once we have a list of those wishing to play, we can get a price for the two receptions and then let the players know what it will cost.

Block play is set up by the organizer, and everyone is given the list of players in their block. Players then schedule their own games within a time period, which, based on the number of players who sign up, could be as little as three weeks or as long as six weeks. At a "due by" date, we will host a Toast & Tally Reception. The only cost to play is the cost of the two receptions. No big prizes are given.

We can host "Challenges" to suit members and change the title to reflect the challenge: A Spring Challenge, a New Members Challenge, Hi-Lo A6W Challenge or Hi-Lo GC Challenge, Welcome Back Challenge, the possibilities are endless. The Croquet Committee is always exploring ways to entertain the members and keep you involved and at the same time offer you something new. What do you think? Please contact me or any committee member with your thoughts, ideas. Thank you!

Lynn Epstein, California Girl Found Palm Beach A Love of Sports Keeps Her Motivated

Raised in Marin County across the Golden Gate Bridge from San Francisco, **Lynn Epstein** migrated East in a very unusual way via Rome, Vienna, and Germany where she lived and worked for several years.

Settling in New York, she met her husband **Stuart** and lived in Westchester for 25 years while he was a "Mad Man" in the advertising business. Stuart came from a family of entrepreneurs, so in 1991 they bought the Devlin McNiff real estate company in Easthampton, LI.

"We were a good combination "says Lynn. "I had been a broker in Westchester and knew sales, and Stuart knew marketing. We sold it in 2011 and stayed active. I still hold my license there, and we have a house on Gardner's Bay with children nearby."

When one of their three children moved to Boca Raton, they wanted to be close to their daughter. The architecture in Palm Beach and its natural beauty and water reminded her of Marin County. Palm Beach is home.

"I was brought up before Title 9 so there were no team sports in school for girls," says Lynn. "I love sports and did join the girls *Aquabatique* water ballet as a child, but in high school we had nothing like that, and I regret it. As an adult I played tennis and golf until an injury stopped me."

A friend in Westhampton had told them about competitive croquet in West Palm Beach. "I remembered that remark, so in 2020 we found NCC, and someone showed us how to play croquet. Like so many others, we joined the summer league and found it a lot of fun."

Lynn joined tournaments. "It's fun to push yourself," says Lynn. She won a doubles tournament and was runner up in a singles tournament. "I really enjoy having a partner and the comradery of creating strategies together," says Lynn.

Bob Van Tassell A Life of Curiosity and Achievement AND Championship Croquet

Bob Van Tassell's life story reads like a tapestry woven from threads of curiosity, dedication and a deep love for exploring. Born in Quakertown, PA, a quaint town nestled between the Delaware and Lehigh Valleys, Bob's journey has taken him from small town roots to global adventures. He studied chemistry at Penn State, which served as the foundation for a diverse career in chemical marketing sales, boiler room work and later, real estate ventures.

"I had plenty of time in the boiler room to read," he shares. "I immersed myself in the classics, psychology, philosophy. Then I became interested in real estate. I started by purchasing three family homes in Boston and Cambridge. Eventually, I bought 17 units and that's where my success really began." Retiring in 1998, Bob spent time in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, before relocating to California. A year later, he stumbled upon the Sonoma-Cutrer winery in Napa, a discovery that would profoundly change his life.



His commitment paid off. After honing his skills, Bob moved to the East Coast of Florida in 2012, where he found himself immersed in the vibrant croquet community at the National Croquet Center.

"My love for croquet began when I was eight," he smiles. "My father bought me my first croquet set, and I played with it until I was 22. Over the years, I've competed and won numerous tourn ents. of my proudest moments was winning first place in the National Croquet Club Championship A6W singles this January 2025."

TIP FROM THE PRO

As I have observed all three varieties of croquet being played at the Club, I have noticed something critical. In the championship flight, players rarely call for an official to make a call, and if they do it is a call on THEIR OWN SHOT. This is mainly to show respect for their opponent, a sign of etiquette.



For other flights, it seems 90 percent of calls for a referee are brought up by an opponent, meaning players making faults do not call on themselves. Please remember that croquet is a game of honor, of fun and honesty, dependent on etiquette on both sides.

This is not just for tournaments. Practice it in your daily games so that it comes naturally. I know it hurts to call a fault on yourself, but please do it. Your opponent will respect you even more when you're both on the same page. And you can pat yourself on the back for being honest, but as Mel Brooks advised, don't break your arm!
