Croquet Foundation of America Announces Historic \$1 Million Challenge Grant and Funding for the \$250,000 Grand Pavillion

Major Gifts Will Propel the National Croquet Center from Plan to Action

In a move to support the expansion and enhancement of the **National Croquet Center (NCC)**, the **Croquet Foundation of America (CFA)** announces a matching grant of up to \$1,000,000 from an anonymous donor and Club member who has committed to match all new contributions dollar-for-dollar, including sponsorships for the Steuber, the Hall of Fame, and other naming opportunities.

This extraordinary matching grant challenge, the largest in CFA's history, marks a transformative moment for the Foundation and the Center. It will fuel critical improvements, including:

- **Expanding courts from 12 to 17**
- **25 additional parking spots**
- **New court lighting surrounding the veranda**
- **A new Grand Pavilion and other facilities**
- **Major renovations to the Headquarters & Museum (the "Clubhouse")**
- **New entry signage including Summit Blvd**

"I discovered croquet later in life, and it's the best sport I've ever played," the donor stated. "Croquet is challenging, great fun, and an opportunity to meet people and make many new friends. I'm delighted to help the Center welcome more players and visitors to the sport I've grown to love."

In addition to the \$1,000,000 challenge grant, the CFA will soon receive another amazing grant: \$250,000 to build the Grand Pavillion in back of the existing courts where the NCC sign is now. That grant is from a second anonymous member-donor who commented "I'm delighted to support the Foundation's project to build The Grand Pavilion because I know what a difference it will make in everyone's enjoyment of the Center. I love its look and functionality."

This generosity is amazing and a testament as to how much they value and enjoy our unique Center. All these donations will significantly advance our mission to promote croquet and expand our ability to serve the community. (continues on page 2)

As for the new courts in the back, the CFA Board has decided that the ballooning cost of \$1.6M to \$1.8M to elevate the five courts in the dry retention area is prohibitive relative to other priorities. That plan would also require further delays in construction and approvals, and we have had enough of those.

The plan now is to build four new championship courts in the dry retention area at the existing level, in addition to the recently completed Pond Court. Approval requirements are minimal and may allow construction to start before year-end. A fifth court there would require a costly, substantial retaining wall, tree removal, and other changes requiring numerous County approvals. Construction of that fifth court can still be undertaken at a later point, depending on available funds and priorities.

This change of plans means we will have substantial funds (when matched) even after the courts and court lighting are complete, to pursue numerous other projects including major projects to repair, remodel and redecorate the "Clubhouse". This will include locker rooms, bathrooms, the Ballroom, and other areas based on new priorities now being established by the CFA Board and our available funds.

We know that night play is getting more popular. Discussions are actively continuing with lighting contractors trying to resolve several technical concerns regarding pole placement, height, timing, capabilities (like dimming & remote controls), light levels achieved, directional glare toward the veranda, etc. We are working to resolve these issues.

Meanwhile, Club members who can help match funds are encouraged to contribute cash, appreciated stock, or make a tax-free direct contribution from your IRA to meet your required minimum distribution. Gifts for tournament sponsorships and court or other naming opportunities also count. Every dollar contributed will be matched, making this a unique opportunity to maximize your impact on the future of the Center and croquet in America.

While there is no specific deadline yet to achieve the match, donations received before year-end will allow us to set better priorities and to design, plan, and implement projects as soon as they have funding. For more information, see me or CFA Executive Director **Franck Meunier**.

Welcome Back and New Unifying Technology Update

First, I would like to welcome many of you back as you escape the cold up north and get ready for a great season of croquet. We had a very successful AC World Championships this fall. I have been asked by many participants to pass on their appreciation and thanks to the Club for our role in supporting the tournament and 'giving up' all our courts to make it happen.

Secondly, I would like to announce that we are in negotiations with the CFA and SandyJames to invest in a unified software platform that will be able to run seamlessly all the activities on the property like food and beverage, pro shop, events and even membership. The recent changes in leadership have given us an opportunity to plan for the future and to enhance not only the member experience but grow the various business units that all work together to deliver member services and also allow us to maintain low Club dues.

The intermittent difficulties accessing the court booking system that most of us are experiencing are symptomatic of the current technology problems we are all facing. Due to their continuous software protocol changes and security updates, the multiple platforms that once made sense no longer communicate with each other or preform as originally implemented.

With one of these new unified platforms members will be able to easily view club events and RSVP directly from the app or website, even pay any costs involved. Members can also book a lesson, reserve a court, purchase pro shop items and even renew their membership. The Croquet Grill will be able to bill a single unified house account. Your house account will provide an email notification on each transaction and a monthly statement of all spending from food and beverage to pro shop, lessons, events and even dues. The communication software is run directly from the membership database so every member can update their communication preferences directly in their profile. From the club phone app, you will see all upcoming club events, member directory, court reservation system, bar and restaurant menu and more. You will even be able to order food from your phone to be ready when your game is over. There will be much more.

I am happy to announce that all the organizations (Club, Center and SandyJames) have agreed in principle to moving forward and a plan for addressing the costs is being developed with potential launch date in early Spring. Stay tuned.

Meet Omero, the CFA Head Superintendent and His Groundskeepers, Who Nightly Mowed for Speed, and Then Changed Hoops

The pristine condition and speed of the National Croquet Center courts caught the attention of both professional and seasoned competitors alike at the AC World championship. Thank you, **Omero Garcia**, the CFA Head Superintendent and his dedicated groundskeepers.

"We are so fortunate to have Omero and his grounds crew here," said **David McCoy**, CFA Chairman. "Their lawn preparation was so impressive that the players voluntarily took up a collection to show their appreciation, and they were brought in to big applause by the players. That's rare! They are a treasure."

Omero met the challenge of this high-profile championship. "For this event, we rolled the turf twice daily, mowed at midnight and again early in the morning, and positioned the out of bounds pipes daily," Omero said. "Then, across all 12 courts, we repositioned the Quadway hoops each day, a task once reserved for players and referees, but one we proudly took on ourselves."

The results were nothing short of remarkable. Through careful adjustments, Omero's team achieved progressively short grass heights—from 0.140 inch to 0.120, then to 0.105, and finally to an incredible 0.100 inch (which is 100 thousandths of an inch) for the championship finals. This produced the fastest court speed ever recorded at the National Croquet Center measuring between 12 and 13 on the speed scale.

Omero was also quick to credit **Michael Albert**, USCA Tournament Director for his mentorship and support. "Michael taught us the proper way to set hoops in perfectly straight lines. He took the time to teach us, to help us, and to trust us. That made all the difference."

When he came to NCC, Omero brought with him a wealth of experience in construction, heavy equipment operation, mechanics, and golf course maintenance, but not croquet. That quickly changed. Determined to meet the demands of this unique sport, he and his staff immersed themselves in the art and science of croquet lawn maintenance. The team monitored soil conditions, used slow-release fertilizers, analyzed lab tested turf samples, and made precise adjustments to ensure the grass's health and resilience.

"My goal for the future is to cut the grass even shorter and increase the speed of the lawns. Let's see if it can be done," he said with a smile. Thanks to the dedication of Omero, his staff, and Michael's guidance, the National Croquet Center set a new standard for excellence.

With the knowledge, tools, and passion now in place, the future of championship croquet at the National Croquet Center has never looked greener or faster.
